Lewis Farms Recreation Centre and Library

Edmonton's west end will soon become a better place to live and play. City Council has officially approved the Lewis Farms Recreation Centre and Library! This state-of-the-art facility will include a dive tank, swimming pool, skate park, twin arenas, high school completion centre, baseball diamonds, and daycare. I have heard from parents for years that it seems impossible to get their kids into swimming lessons without being on a waitlist first. Also, that ice time is in huge demand across the city. Not only is this facility going to be a hub for sports, fitness, and recreation in our City but it also provides critical services like daycare and a library. To access these services currently, residents of the west end to drive to other corners of the city. Opening this new facility will mean these resources are only a few blocks away. This will benefit the city as a whole as their will hopefully be less crowding in our existing facilities.



Residents have been advocating for this project for years and with their feedback, the recreation centre will now be a reality. This facility will be built in the community of Rosenthal and will serve as a needed community hub for residents of the west end. This new facility is high-quality and the price tag reflects that. I am of the mindset that recreation facilities and libraries are core services that our taxes should fund. Community services like the Lewis Farms Recreation Centre provide services that are core to our mandate as a city. So when is this facility going to be built? There is still about a year left in the detailed design work and the completion of the construction drawings. That likely

means construction starts in early 2021 and it is going to be a multi-year project. So while we still have some time before the doors will open, the money has been approved which means that the project will keep moving forward. This facility is long overdue and I can't wait for the doors to open!

Report an issue to 311

311 is Edmonton's non-emergency phone line for City government information and services. It provides residents, businesses and visitors with ease of access through a central point of contact for their city needs. It helps the City of Edmonton to recognize and prioritize actions based on the number of similar complaints. It also helps to track your inquiry by providing you with a reference number.

Connect to 311 on-line through the City website or phone 311 to see how this service can work for you. You can submit an on-line request for a number of services and concerns such as sidewalk, street/traffic lights, graffiti, unsightly properties, park maintenance and parking complaints.

You can also download the free Edmonton 311 app to report your concerns while you are on the go.
